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

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

Subgroup Methodology and Differences

Per CEP's standard methodology, groups of fewer than ten respondents are excluded from display and from statistical analysis. Where possible, CEP does run trend analysis among groups to understand if ratings differ from the overall rating by more than 0.3 across survey measures.

Subgroup Methodology

Strategy Area: Using the grantee list provided by the Foundation, CEP tagged grantees based on whether grantees belonged to each of the following strategy areas:

- College Career Pathways
- Enabling Communities
- K12
- Multiple
- None

Primary Geographic Focus: Using data grantees provided in the survey, CEP tagged grantees based on the primary geographic focus of their organization's work.

Primary Approach: Using data grantees provided in the survey, CEP tagged grantees based on their organization's primary approach to carry out the funded work.

Grant Type: Using the grantee list provided by the Foundation, CEP tagged grantees based on the type of grant they received.

Respondent Gender Identity: Using data grantees provided in the survey, CEP tagged grantees based on their gender identity. Those segmented as "Identifies as a Man" selected "Man" only, and those segmented as "Identifies as a Woman" selected "Woman" only.

Respondent Person of Color Identity: Using data grantees provided in the survey, CEP tagged grantees based on their identity as a Person of Color.

Respondents' Intersectional Identity: Using data grantees provided in the survey, CEP created four categories to represent the intersection of respondent gender identity and respondent person of color identity.

Subgroup Differences

Strategy Area: Grantees tagged to K12 rate significantly higher than other grantees for a few measures across the survey, including the Foundation's impact on and understanding of their fields, impact on their organizations, awareness of their challenges, responsiveness, clarity and consistency of its communications, and for the helpfulness of its selection process.

Primary Geographic Focus: There are no consistent significant differences in ratings when segmented by grantees' geographic focus.

Primary Approach: There are no consistent significant differences in ratings when segmented by grantees' primary approach.

Grant Type: Partnership grantees rate significantly higher than President's Discretionary grantees for a few measures across the survey, including the Foundation's impact on their organizations, awareness of their challenges, and its responsiveness and openness.

Partnership grantees, however, also report experiencing significant more pressure than President's Discretionary grantees to modify their organizational priorities in order to receive funding.

Respondent Gender: Skillman grantees who identify exclusively as a woman (69% of respondents) rate the Foundation significantly lower than those who identify exclusively as a man (29% of respondents) across multiple survey measures, including for:

- Skillman's understanding of grantees' field, communities, organizations, and the needs of the people and communities served,
- · Grantees' comfort approaching the Foundation if a problem arises and the extent to which the Foundation exhibits respectful interaction,
- The Foundation's overall transparency, the clarity of its communications, and the extent to which the Foundation exhibits candor about its perspectives on grantees' work.
- Commitment to and communications about diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Analyses also show women grantees are significantly less likely than men grantees to receive non-monetary support and multiyear unrestricted grants. There were no significant differences with regards to other grantmaking characteristics (i.e., grant size and grant length), organizational characteristics (i.e. annual organization budget, and interactions patterns (i.e., contact frequency, initiation of contact, and contact change) between women and men.




Proportion of Multi-year Grants





To what extent has the Foundation advanced the state of knowledge in your field?










How comfortable do you feel approaching the Foundation if a problem arises?





To what extent is the Foundation open to ideas from grantees about its strategy?






How often do/did you have contact with your program officer during this grant?

How often do/did you have contact with your program officer during this grant? - By Subgroup









How clearly has the Foundation communicated its goals and strategy to you?








How well does the Foundation understand the needs of the people and communities that you serve?

To what extent do the Foundation's funding priorities reflect a deep understanding of the needs of the people and communities that you serve?







To what extent was the Foundation's selection process a helpful opportunity to strengthen the efforts funded by the grant?






To what extent was the Foundation's selection process an appropriate level of effort given the amount of funding received?


To what extent was the Foundation's selection process an appropriate level of effort given the amount of funding received? - By Subgroup










Participation in Reporting and/or Evaluation Processes



Participation in Reporting and/or Evaluation Processes - By Subgroup





To what extent was the Foundation's reporting process straightforward?





To what extent was the Foundation's reporting process adaptable, if necessary, to fit your circumstances?







Median Grant Size





Median Hours Spent on Proposal and Selection Process



Median Hours Spent on Monitoring, Reporting and Evaluation Process Per Year







To what extent do you find the following statements about your program officer to be true: - By Subgroup











Selected Suggestions

Grantees were asked to provide any suggestions for how the Foundation could improve. The 94 grantees that responded to the survey provided a total of 48 distinct suggestions. These suggestions were thematically categorized by CEP and grouped into the topics below.

Grantmaking Characteristics (27% N=13)

- Provide Multiyear Grants (N = 5)
 - "The problems we are tackling are deeply rooted and aren't solved in a year. I'd like to see more multi-year commitments made. Communities aren't
 - particularly served by programs starting and stopping, and there isn't some magic pot of money for most human service work."
 - "Consider multi-year funding."
- More Flexibility in Timing of Grant Approvals and Usage of Funds (N = 3)
 - "We would appreciate more flexibility with how and when grant funds may be spent. ...because our fiscal year cycle (which tracks the academic year cycle) does not align with the Foundation's proposal timeline, it is difficult for us to fund crucial work that happens earlier in the school year."
- Provide General Operating Support (N = 3)
 - "Skillman could be a better funder if they offer general operating funds."
- Focus on Consistency of Funding (N = 2)
 - "More transparency and planning for the future would give our organization the ability to plan ahead and predict what kind of relationship we can have with the Foundation as our work grows moving ahead. Our partnership has been inconsistent in the past and so we would love to have a clearer sense of what the future may hold."

Foundation Communications (15% N=7)

- Clearer Articulation of Priorities and Overall Vision of the Foundation (N = 5)
 - "I think the Foundation and its funders would benefit from a clear theory of change that the Foundation is trying to enact through its funding. Sometimes the foundation's big goals seem misaligned with its funding priorities, so seeing how they view this theory of change would be helpful."
 - "Provide more details about the Foundation's vision for collective impact in Detroit."
- Share Perspectives on Issues in the Field (N = 2)
 - "Be more forceful in your suggestions for reducing chronic absenteeism. The local solutions for Detroit's landscape need to be more widely known and supported. Our organization and others would benefit from your voice here."

Funder-Grantee Interactions (15% N=7)

- Prioritize Openness and Two-Way Conversations (N = 3)
 - "Key staff have to be better listeners and strategists, allowing discussions with grantee partners to actually shape the Foundation's agenda if that is what the Foundation says its intentions are."
- Improve Responsiveness (N = 2)
 - "Ensuring that all staff are responsive."
- More Frequent Interactions (N = 2)
 - "Bi-Monthly check ins with staff to discuss future ideas and opportunities within the Foundation."

Impact on and Understanding of Grantees' Fields (15% N=7)

- Consider Funding in Additional Fields (N = 3)
 - "We would love to be able to apply for arts-focused funding opportunities that promote/interrogate impact and effectiveness on youth and communities in Detroit, both short and long-term, i.e. that support data driven outcomes and support grantees in evaluating those outcomes."
- More Collaboration with Other Funders (N = 2)
 - "I think that the Foundation should look for ways to influence and collaborate with larger funders."
- Stronger Commitment to Policy and Advocacy (N = 2)
 - "Getting more involved in policy."

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (8% N=4)

• Advance DEI in Internal and External Work (N = 4)

- "Uplifting the black educational leaders in the city that are over looked by racism."
- "When identifying strategies to support programs, reporting on trends, messaging to the broader community, working with partners, etc., the Foundation has a responsibility to broaden its language and not talk about things from a binary perspective. This makes the minority ethnic groups feel left out and does not take into account the nuances of the other ethnic communities."

Non-monetary Assistance (8% N=4)

- Build Grantees' Capacity (N = 3)
 - "I would simply suggest continuing to expose program leaders to best practices discovered around the country. Professional development training and perhaps supporting organizational and individual professionals development training."
- Other (N = 1)

Reporting and Evaluation Processes (6% N=3)

- Work with Grantees to Develop Metrics for Success (N = 2)
 - "I believe the Foundation could be more clear in the ways it uses data provided by our organization to understand the success of projects and to make future funding decisions. If we had a better idea of how the reporting metrics are used, we may be able to actually provide better metrics than the ones being asked for."






Primary Beneficiary of Grant







Respondent Demographics

Note: Survey questions about respondents' demographics were recently modified or added to match best practices, and depict comparative data from over 50 funders in the dataset. Demographic questions related to grantees' POC and racial/ethnic identity are only asked of respondents in the United States.

Survey language and response options for questions about race and ethnicity are guided by best practices shared by National Institutes of Health, Pew Research Center, Psi Chi Journal of Psychological Research, and the US Census Bureau.

Survey language and response options for questions about gender and LGBTQ+ identity are guided by best practices shared by Funders For LGBTQ Issues, HRC Foundation's Welcoming Schools, and the Williams Institute of the University of California – Los Angeles School of Law.

Survey respondents are asked to share their gender identities in a check-all-that-apply question. Each chart has the option of showing the average ratings of respondents who selected only "man," only "woman," multiple gender identities, "gender non-conforming or non-binary," "prefer to self-identify," and "prefer not to say" - as long as that response option had at least 10 respondents.

Differences in Ratings by Respondent Demographics

Where response counts allow, it is CEP's standard practice to analyze responses for differences by respondents' demographics characteristics. There are too few respondents to analyze results by Transgender Identity, LGBTQ+ Identity, and Disability Identity.

Person of Color Identity

Ratings from grantees who identify as a person of color are significantly higher than grantees who identify as not a person of color for the following measures:

· Clarity and transparency of the proposal criteria

Ratings from grantees who identify as a person of color are significantly lower than grantees who identify as not a person of color for the following measures:

- Level of pressure to modify grantees' priorities to create a request that was likely to receive funding (1 = no pressure, 7 = significant pressure)
